ORDER GRANTING PRELIMINARY CLASS SETTLEMENT APPROVAL

Before the Court is Plaintiff's Motion for Preliminary Approval of Class Action Settlement (the "Motion"), the terms of which are set forth in a Settlement Agreement between Plaintiff and M.I Industries, Inc. d/b/a Instinct Pet Food ("Instinct" or "Defendant" and, together with Plaintiff, the "Parties"), with accompanying exhibits attached as Exhibit 1 to Plaintiff's Memorandum of Law in Support of the Motion (the "Settlement Agreement").1

Having fully considered the issue, the Court hereby GRANTS the Motion and **ORDERS** as follows:

> Class Certification for Settlement Purposes Only. The Settlement 1.

¹ All defined terms in this Order Granting Preliminary Approval of Class Action Settlement ("Preliminary Approval Order") have the same meaning as set forth in the Settlement Agreement, unless otherwise indicated.

Agreement provides for a Settlement Class defined as follows:

All persons residing in the United States whose PII was or may have been compromised in the M.I. Industries, Inc. Data Breach that was detected on or around October 16, 2024, including all those who received notice of the Data Breach from M.I. Industries, Inc.

Excluded from the Settlement Class are: (i) Defendant; (ii) the Related Entities; (iii) all Settlement Class Members who timely and validly request exclusion from the Settlement Class; (iv) any judges assigned to this case and their staff and family; and (v) any other Person found by a court of competent jurisdiction to be guilty under criminal law of initiating, causing, aiding, or abetting the criminal activity occurrence of the Data Incident or who pleads *nolo contendere* to any such charge.

Pursuant to Missouri Rule of Civil Procedure 52.08(e), the Court finds that giving notice is justified. The Court finds that it will likely be able to approve the proposed Settlement as fair, reasonable, and adequate. The Court also finds that it will likely be able to certify the Settlement Class for purposes of judgment on the Settlement because it meets all of the requirements of Rule 52.08(a) and (b). Specifically, the Court finds for settlement purposes only that: (a) the Settlement Class is so numerous that joinder of all Settlement Class Members would be impracticable; (b) there are questions of law and fact that are common to the Settlement Class; (c) the claims of the Settlement Class Representative are typical, and the Settlement Class Representative seeks similar relief as the claims of the Settlement Class Members; (d) the Settlement Class Representative will fairly and adequately protect the interests of the Settlement Class; (e) questions of law or fact common to Settlement Class Members predominate over any questions affecting only

individual members; and (f) a class action and class settlement is superior to other methods available for a fair and efficient resolution of this Lawsuit.

- 2. The Settlement Class Representative and Settlement Class Counsel. The Court finds that Plaintiff Adam Schroeder will likely satisfy the requirements of Rule 52.08(a) and should be appointed as the Settlement Class Representative. Additionally, the Court finds that Brittany Resch of Strauss Borrelli PLLC and Colleen Garvey of Stranch, Jennings & Garvey PLLC will likely satisfy the requirements of Rule 52.08(a) and should be appointed as Settlement Class Counsel.
- 3. Preliminary Settlement Approval. Upon preliminary review, the Court finds the Settlement is fair, reasonable, and adequate to warrant providing notice of the Settlement to the Settlement Class and accordingly is preliminarily approved. In making this determination, the Court has considered the monetary and non-monetary benefits provided to the Settlement Class through the Settlement, the specific risks faced by the Settlement Class in prevailing on their claims, the good faith, arms' length negotiations between the Parties and absence of any collusion in the Settlement, the effectiveness of the proposed method for distributing relief to the Settlement Class, the proposed manner of allocating benefits to Settlement Class Members, the equitable treatment of the Settlement Class Members under the Settlement, and all of the other factors required by Rule 52.08 and relevant case law.
- 4. <u>Jurisdiction</u>. The Court has personal jurisdiction over the parties before it. Additionally, venue is proper in this Court.
 - 5. Final Approval Hearing. A Final Approval Hearing shall be held on

16, 2026, in Division 6, Circuit Court of St. Louis County, 105 South Central Avenue, Clayton, MO 63105, where the Court will determine, among other things, whether: (a) the Settlement Class should be finally certified for settlement purposes; (b) the Settlement should be approved as fair, reasonable, and adequate, and finally approved; (c) this action should be dismissed with prejudice pursuant to the terms of the Settlement Agreement; (d) Settlement Class Members (who have not timely and validly excluded themselves from the Settlement) should be bound by the releases set forth in the Settlement Agreement; (e) the application of Settlement Class Counsel for an award of attorneys' fees, and costs, should be approved; and (f) the application of the Settlement Class Representative's for a Service Award should be approved.

- 6. <u>Settlement Administrator</u>. The Court appoints Analytics Consulting LLC as the Settlement Administrator, with responsibility for class notice and settlement administration. The Settlement Administrator is directed to perform all tasks the Settlement Agreement requires. The Settlement Administrator's fees will be paid pursuant to the terms of the Settlement Agreement.
- 7. Notice. The proposed notice program set forth in the Settlement Agreement and the Notices and Claim Form attached to the Settlement Agreement as Exhibits A, B, and C are hereby approved. Non-material modifications to these Exhibits may be made by the Settlement Administrator in consultation and agreement with the Parties, but without further order of the Court.
- 8. <u>Findings Concerning Notice</u>. The Court finds that the proposed form, content, and method of giving Notice to the Settlement Class as described in the Settlement

Agreement and its exhibits: (a) will constitute the best practicable notice to the Settlement Class; (b) are reasonably calculated, under the circumstances, to apprise Settlement Class Members of the pendency of the Lawsuit, the terms of the proposed Settlement, and their rights under the proposed Settlement, including, but not limited to, their rights to object to or exclude themselves from the proposed Settlement and other rights under the terms of the Settlement Agreement; (c) are reasonable and constitute due, adequate, and sufficient notice to all Settlement Class Members and other persons entitled to receive notice; (d) meet all applicable requirements of law, including Rule 52.08; and (e) and meet the requirements of the Due Process Clause(s) of the United States and Missouri Constitutions. The Court further finds that the Notice provided for in the Settlement Agreement is written in plain language, uses simple terminology, and is designed to be readily understandable by Settlement Class Members.

The Settlement Administrator is directed to carry out the Notice program in conformance with the Settlement Agreement.

9. Exclusion from Class. Any Settlement Class Member who wishes to be excluded from the Settlement Class must individually sign and timely submit a written request to the designated address established by the Settlement Administrator in the manner provided in the Notice. The written request must clearly manifest a person's intent to be excluded from the Settlement Class, as set forth in the Settlement Agreement, and must be submitted individually, *i.e.*, one request is required for every Settlement Class Member seeking exclusion. To be effective, such requests for exclusion must be postmarked no later than the Opt-Out Deadline, which is no later than sixty (60) days from dissemination of the

Notice, and as stated in the Notice.

Within ten (10) days after the Opt-Out Deadline, the Settlement Administrator shall furnish to Settlement Class Counsel and to Defendant's Counsel a complete list of all timely and valid requests for exclusion.

If a Final Approval Order and Judgment is entered, all Persons falling within the definition of the Settlement Class who do not timely and validly request to be excluded from the Settlement Class shall be bound by the terms of this Settlement Agreement and the Final Approval Order and Judgment. All Persons who submit valid and timely requests to be excluded from the Settlement Class shall not receive any cash benefits of and/or be bound by the terms of the Settlement Agreement.

Objections and Appearances. A Settlement Class Member (who does not submit a timely written request for exclusion) desiring to object to the Settlement Agreement may submit a timely written objection by the Objection Deadline and as stated in the Notice. The Notice shall instruct Settlement Class Members who wish to object to the Settlement Agreement to file their objections with the Court. The Notice also shall advise Settlement Class Members of the deadline for submission of any objections—the "Objection Deadline." Any such objections to the Settlement Agreement must be written and must include all of the following: (i) the objecting Settlement Class Member's full name, mailing address, telephone number, and email address (if any); (ii) the objecting Settlement Class Member's personal and original signature; (iii) information identifying the objector as a Settlement Class Member, including proof that the objector is within the Settlement Class (e.g., copy of the Notice or copy of original notice of the Data Incident);

(iv) a statement of all grounds for the objection, including any legal support for the objection that the objector believes applicable; (v) the identification of all counsel representing the objector; (vi) a statement regarding whether the objector and/or his or her counsel will appear at the Final Approval Hearing, and; (vii) contain the signature of the objector's duly authorized attorney or other duly authorized representative (if any), along with documentation setting forth such representation. To be timely, written notice of an objection must be filed with the Clerk of Court by the Objection Deadline, which is no later than sixty (60) days from the Notice Deadline.

Any Settlement Class Member who fails to comply with the requirements for objecting shall waive and forfeit any and all rights he or she may have to appear separately and/or to object to the Settlement Agreement, shall be bound by all the terms of the Settlement Agreement and by all proceedings, orders, and judgments in the Lawsuit, and shall be precluded from seeking any review of the Settlement Agreement and/or Final Approval Order and Judgment by appeal or other means. The provisions stated in the Settlement Agreement shall be the exclusive means for any challenge to the Settlement Agreement. Any challenge to the Settlement Agreement, the final order approving this Settlement Agreement, or the Final Order and Judgment to be entered upon final approval shall be pursuant to appeal under the Missouri Rules of Civil Procedure and not through a collateral attack.

11. <u>Claims Process</u>. Settlement Class Counsel and Defendant have created a process for Settlement Class Members to claim benefits under the Settlement. The Court preliminarily approves this process and directs the Settlement Administrator to make the

Claim Form or its substantial equivalent available to Settlement Class Members in the manner specified in the Notice.

The Settlement Administrator will be responsible for effectuating the claims process.

Settlement Class Members who qualify for and wish to submit a Claim Form shall do so in accordance with the requirement and procedures specified in the Notice and the Claim Form. If the Final Order and Judgment is entered, all Settlement Class Members who qualify for any benefit under the Settlement but fail to submit a claim in accordance with the requirements and procedures specified in the Notice and the Claim Form shall be forever barred from receiving any such benefit, but will in all other respects be subject to and bound by the provisions in the Final Order and Judgment, including the releases contained in the Settlement Agreement and in the Final Order and Judgment.

12. Termination of Settlement. This Preliminary Approval Order shall become null and void and shall be without prejudice to the rights of the Parties, all of whom shall be restored to their respective positions existing before the Court entered this Preliminary Approval Order and before they entered the Settlement Agreement, if: (a) the Court does not enter this Preliminary Approval Order; (b) the Court denies final approval of the Settlement (or grants final approval through an order that materially differs in substance from Exhibit E attached to the Settlement Agreement); (c) the Final Order and Judgment does not become Final because a higher court reverses final approval by the Court; or (d) if the Effective Date should not occur for any reason. In such event, (i) the Settlement and all orders entered in connection therewith shall be rendered null and void; (ii) the terms

and provisions of the Settlement Agreement shall have no further force and effect with respect to the Parties and shall not be used in the Lawsuit or in any other proceeding for any purpose, and any judgment or order entered by the Court in accordance with the terms of the Settlement Agreement shall be treated as vacated, *nunc pro tunc*; (iii) Defendant shall be responsible for all Costs of Settlement Administration incurred prior to the termination or disapproval; (iv) all Parties shall be deemed to have reverted to their respective positions and status in the Lawsuit as of the date this Settlement Agreement was executed and shall jointly request that a new case schedule be entered by the Court; and (v) Defendant shall have no payment, reimbursement, or other financial obligation of any kind as a result of this Settlement Agreement, other than as stated in Sub-Part (iii) above.

- 13. <u>Use of Order</u>. This Preliminary Approval Order shall be of no force or effect if the Final Order and Judgment is not entered or there is no Effective Date and shall not be construed or used as an admission, concession, or declaration by or against Defendant of any fault, wrongdoing, breach, liability, or propriety of certifying any class. Nor shall this Preliminary Approval Order be construed or used as an admission, concession, or declaration by or against the Class Representatives or any other Settlement Class Member that his or her claims lack merit or that the relief requested is inappropriate, improper, unavailable, or as a waiver by any Party of any defense or claims they may have in this Lawsuit or in any other lawsuit.
- 14. <u>Continuance of Hearing</u>. The Court reserves the right to adjourn or continue the Final Approval Hearing and related deadlines without further written notice to the Settlement Class. If the Court alters any of those dates or times, the revised dates and times

shall be posted on the Settlement Website maintained by the Settlement Administrator. The Court may approve the Settlement, with such modifications as may be agreed upon by the Parties, if appropriate, without further notice to the Settlement Class.

- 15. <u>Stay of Litigation.</u> All proceedings in the Lawsuit, other than those related to approval of the Settlement Agreement, are hereby stayed. Further, any actions brought by Settlement Class Members concerning the Released Claims are hereby enjoined and stayed pending Final Approval of the Settlement Agreement.
- 16. <u>Schedule and Deadlines</u>. The Court orders the following schedule of dates for the specified actions/further proceedings:
